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Note: Due to the current state of national emergency, from the Covid-19 pandemic, and the need to comply with federal, state and local mandates, and to help prevent the spread of infection, these Council meetings were conducted via teleconference. Council members were on one conference phone with open two-way communications for motions, deliberations, and voting. City Administration was also included on this line for any questions. The public could watch and listen on the Local Cable Access channel 1020 and a second conference phone was provided for the public to call in to listen. This second line could be unmuted if the public petitioned to speak before Council. Y-City News also broadcast the Council meeting on Facebook Live Stream.

Mr. Vincent: Addressing anyone watching, Council is here by conference phone, which you see here in front of me. If you are watching and sound quality is an issue you can also listen in by calling 1-712-770-5505. The access code is 809642. I know that is a lot of numbers. If you have Facebook and you go to the City's Facebook page and those numbers are there also.

PUBLIC HEARING

Mr. Vincent welcomed everyone to the public hearing. For those of you joining on TV we have two members of Council present. With that we have Councilmembers who are tuned in on a conference line. You will be hearing them in a moment when we have roll call. We are here tonight for a public hearing.

A Public Hearing was held at 6:15 p.m., Monday, April 27, 2020 in the City of Zanesville's Council Chambers, 401 Market Street, Zanesville, Ohio to hear a request to amend and revise the zoning map and make permanent zoning in the City of Zanesville, Ohio from the existing zoning district of I-1, Light Industrial to A&E, Agriculture and Estate on Muskingum County Parcel Number 85-36-01-07-000 situated in the City of Zanesville, County of Muskingum, Ohio, and State of Ohio. All testimony for and against will be heard. I will turn it over to Matthew Schley to give us the information.

Matthew Schley: Thanks for having me here, members of Council. Today you are hearing a zoning map amendment. The parcel as he said is 85-36-01-07-000. It is also known as the Lear property. It is a 28.53-acre parcel. It is currently zoned I-1 Industrial. What is being proposed is a zoning map amendment to change it to A&E which is our Agriculture and Estate zoning. A&E is often referred to as a place holder. It is used to preserve large open areas for future urban development. This was presented to the Planning Commission back in March with the recommendation of approval. They found it was consistent with the Comprehensive Plan objectives. The first one is LUG2, which is the City shall take steps to encourage and enhance riverfront areas. This property is adjacent to the Muskingum River so obviously it is a very valuable piece of land and preserving our riverfront areas. LUG3, Brownfield sites must be changed in order to strengthen neighborhoods. This property sits adjacent to a number of residential properties and legal non-conforming residential properties. It is ultimately in the interest to preserve and to change Brownfield sites to have redevelopment and strengthen those neighborhoods. Next LUP3.2 feeds back into our LUG3 which is abandoned

properties are given preference. There hasn't been any development on this site since 2015 or any changes at all. In 1983 this site was added to the National properties list due to ground water contamination. It is essentially a registered brownfield site. The reason behind A&E is a grant to a new property owner of the maximum flexibility for future development, but also grants the City an added layer of control over what type of development could happen there. A&E is a very restricted zoning classification compared to even I-1 which is a fairly restricted zoning classification of itself. What wouldn't be allowed there is another industrial development. This would allow the City to say how we feel that this property could be used for its best use. With that being said, the Planning Commission did recommend this for approval during the regular March 2020 meeting.

Mr. Vincent: Thank you. We will do roll call at the end, my apologies. If you could again refresh us on A&E the and the potential there.

Matthew Schley: Right now, A&E is really designed kind of a two-phase piece. So, the first phase it was used to bring new properties into the City, large pieces of properties like out on Wayne Avenue. A number of those properties are large lots that are zoned A&E and the purpose of that is it is like a land bank, like a banking of the land almost because we can instead of saying this is going to be residential, industrial, or commercial. We say this is going to maintain the same integrity. The other purpose of A&E behind it is to preserve land for future development that has already been developed. So, things like large vacant sites that have been demolished or things of that nature. You can zone that A&E and it will allow you in the future to do lot splits, or redevelop it the way it is so it is better suited for the future than what it is now.

Mr. Vincent: So in the future different zoning may be needed and then you can go the direction that fits.

Mr. Schley: Absolutely. I mean it is a very large parcel, 28.5 acres. I mean you could easily carve that up into any number of our zoning districts. You could make it PUD or a number of things. The goal right now is preserving it and preventing it from becoming another industrial use that could potentially harm the neighborhood and not help it.

Mr. Vincent: Okay, thank you. Are there questions from Council?

Ms. Gildow: Mr. Schley, does this in any way narrow the target market of entities that might be interested in obtaining the Lear site if this runs through the land bank for acquisition by another entity.

Mr. Schley: I would say no. The reason being is that it really just opens it up to whatever a developer would want to do. It certainly limits it in the scope of what somebody could do today. Once this is passed and in order for somebody to do some sort of commercial/residential development of some sort they would have to come back through this process and gain approval. That would allow the City to have a little better control over what could go there. In my opinion, it would be expanding things instead of

limiting them. As it sits right now it is almost stuck perpetually as industrial. This would allow it to become something better and better suited for the future.

Ms. Gildow: That sounds great! Thank you.

Mr. Vincent: With that and I am not sure who it was of Council on the phone. Do you have a question?

Mark Baker: Could you characterize any of the plans that the City has for brownfield mitigation on the site?

Matt Schley: I believe the Mayor would be better suited to answer that question. I can say there has been mitigation. I believe a Phase 1 and a Phase 2 were done on that site. I believe that the Mayor would have a better understanding as to the future plans for that site.

Mayor Mason: Thank you, Matt. Councilman Baker, could I, as I want to make sure I hear your question better. Could you state it again?

Mark Baker: Yes, without going into a whole lot of detail on it. What are the plans the City has for brownfield mitigation which of course would be necessary to develop that area as the city wants it to be developed anyway?

Mayor Mason: I will try to give you a short answer that doesn't give away any legal strategy to outside parties. This site has been reviewed and walked by Ohio EPA, the Ohio Attorney General's office, and other public members from Zanesville government. There are limited areas where there are materials such as asbestos. We have looked at those. There are other areas to the north that actually fall into a Superfund site. I know you didn't ask about a Superfund, but you mentioned brownfield. We believe that could be redefined. By redefine, I mean, soils testing to see what the delineation of that area is, but then subsequently, again I think you know Mark, I would like to have the city take control and start the cleanup. Again, some of it like the asbestos would have to be hand pulled in order to make sure it doesn't scatter into the wind. The asbestos is actually part of the shingles that are attached to that structure that is still there. A lot of times people look at what is on the ground and think they see something there. There might be some foam or things of that nature there, but the asbestos we believe is actually still attached to the structure that is there. Again, some of that is going to have to go to hazardous disposal and the other can go to a construction site. I can talk about more in executive session if you want to.

Mark Baker: Okay, so Mr. Mayor, would there potentially be superfund money from the federal government for such mitigation in the area? I assume there would have to be some sort of certification involved?

Mayor Mason: You are using some terms that I am not sure they go hand in hand. This site has been certified as a Superfund site. EPA and the Attorney General's office

believes it can be redefined in terms of where the hazardous materials still are and subsurface soils contamination. So, that is one thing that can be done. That is to the north. To the south where the structure is, you will see that there is a building there, a relatively good steel structure standing on the back side and I would have to remember; as I am just going from memory, other locations. There is actually like a shingle covering the building and that is what is asbestos. That would need to be disposed of separately. Now, there are brownfield grants available, that cannot be used on superfund sites. So one of the reasons that it is important to clearly redefine or clearly delineate that area that is a superfund is that it frees up additional acreage or the rest of the acreage, to be used as part of brownfields mitigation and alleviation. So, there is a good chance that somewhere around 20 acres of it; maybe a little more or a little less, is subject to brownfields but wouldn't be subject to superfund.

Mark Baker: That is out of how many acres?

Mayor Mason: It is a little over 28 acres. You may ask Bill Arnett.

Mark Baker: Thank you, Mr. Mayor.

Mayor Mason: Bill Arnett is here and he might have additional information that I have missed.

Bill Arnett: Mr. Baker and members of Council, the Mayor is exactly right. It is really odd, but when you have a superfund site you are not able to access U.S. EPA grant dollars to do remediation or cleanup. So, the road that the city has started down with U.S. EPA Region 5 is to try to determine what needs to happen on the site in total to allow us to, like the Mayor said, re-delineate the superfund portion. The superfund portion is just a small percentage of the total site so once it gets delineated and gets pulled apart where part of it is superfund and part of it is not, then you could actually access money from Ohio EPA or U.S. EPA to help with the cleanup. You have to get the superfund designation off the entire site before those dollars become available.

Mark Baker: Perfect, that makes sense. So, it is basically a re-designation of what is and what isn't a superfund site so that money can be used.

Bill Arnett: Correct.

Mayor Mason: I am just guessing based on legislative history that when the United States Congress set up brownfields, I will call them rules in funding. They probably wanted to make sure that went strictly to brownfields because it could stretch a little bit further. If you applied brownfields' money toward superfund sites it would have sucked that pot dry and you would never have money for true brownfields. So, frankly, I think Congress was wise when they created this in basically two separate pots of money so to protect and allow cities like us to go forward on brownfields.

Bill Arnett: I think the other point is that United Technologies (UT) has been working to mediate or to remediate the superfund contamination for probably close to 30 years. They have been pumping water to try to clean this up of soil contamination and the ground water contamination. United Technologies is really the responsible party for U.S. EPA for that brownfield contamination. It doesn't deal with, like the Mayor said like the asbestos on the buildings that have been partially knocked down, but in terms of the ground water and the soil contamination. UT has been working on that for years, for decades.

Mark Baker: Okay, thank you.

Mr. Vincent: Are there any other questions from Council? Do we have anyone from the public on the line? The volume is turned up, correct? Is there anyone from the public to speak for or against this? Is there anyone on the public line that is muted that wants to speak for or against this? I will give you a moment here, last chance. Is there anyone to speak for or against this? Ok, one last call out to Council, is there anyone else from Council? Okay, hearing nothing, we will call this public hearing to a close except we will do a quick roll call so we know who is here on the line.

Ordinance No. 2020-64 – Introduced by Council – An Ordinance authorizing the proper city official to purchase a new 2021 Freightliner Vactor Truck 114SB Chassis with a Cummins Engine and Allison Transmission from Jack Doheny Company for the Water Division through the State of Ohio Cooperative Purchasing Program.

Mr. Vincent: With that we are at first reading or I would entertain a motion to waive. I know there are some concerns about spending at this time which we will discuss with the Mayor. We need a motion to waive or first reading. What is Council's pleasure?

Mr. Sharrer moved for first reading, seconded by Miss Bradshaw.

Mr. Vincent: Is there any discussion?

Mrs. Osborn: Mr. President, are we discussing waiving or are we discussing the Ordinance?

Mr. Vincent: We are discussing the ordinance right now. It is for first reading. So, it is discussion on the ordinance.

Mrs. Osborn: I was just curious. I know we try to go through the Cooperative Purchasing Program, but did we shop any local vendors that could possibly match it?

Mr. Vincent: With that, I will turn to Mr. Brown. The question here is Councilwoman Osborn is aware this is through the state purchase program which I think is usually the best and very hard to beat. With that, she is questioning whether it has been shopped local or if there are some other options here.

Mr. Brown: This particular unit because it is so specialized there are not a whole lot of companies that make this type of vehicle. There may be a company that is closer than Jack Doheny which is south of Cleveland, so they are in Ohio, but they are a couple of hours away. The State of Ohio gets all of the bid specs and then all of these different companies put in and there is a winner for that year and Jack Doheny was the winner. The water department has spent about eight to nine months scrutinizing all of these different vehicles. They brought in about five different ones. They had to decide whether they were going to use the state purchase or whether or not they wanted to go through the formal bid. They liked the Jack Doheny model the best and it happened to be the winner of the state purchase price so that is how we settled on that one. I honestly am not sure if there is a company that makes vac trucks that is located technically closer to Zanesville than Jack Doheny, but Jack Doheny is within a couple of hours and they are in Ohio.

Mr. Vincent: So you are not sure if anyone local could bid.

Scott Brown: To be honest with you, I am not sure. There is nobody in Zanesville, I know that. There is nobody in Muskingum County that makes this type of vehicle specifically. Whether there is a company within a couple of counties over that is closer than this one, I honestly don't know.

Mr. Vincent: Mrs. Osborn, does that answer your question?

Mrs. Osborn: Yes, thank you.

Mr. Vincent: Are there any other questions from Council?

Mr. Sharrer: I had a quick question on the expenditure of this and the next ordinance. I guess how that fits into the Mayor's memo of kind of watching our dollars right now during this pandemic.

Mr. Vincent: So, turning to the Mayor. I think talking with Rhonda and our local funding here in a month and I will let you go ahead and answer.

Mayor Mason: Rhonda and Scott of course are more free to also address this. We are not using cash outlay for this, Mr. Sharrer, my big concern has been all those items if we were using cash for and Rhonda and I are still watching the numbers. We are looking at the gasoline tax to see if we are going to have enough money for the pavement programs. We are also looking at the fact that there has been a small dip in the water, sewer, and sanitation. I will be curious to see once the moratorium lifts here on May 1 how those numbers respond. Rhonda, do you want to add anything to clarify?

Rhonda Heskett: No, other than the...

Mr. Vincent: Would you come forward just so everyone can hear? This is the Budget and Finance Director Rhonda Heskett.

Rhonda Heskett: Sorry about that. No, I just would like to reiterate what the Mayor said that we had originally intended to purchase this with a cash purchase and now some of the bigger items that we do have laid out for this year we are going to finance to hold onto our cash.

Mr. Vincent: So with this tonight, if Council would decide to waive this and pass it tonight, doesn't mean it has to be purchased right now? I assume you could wait until finance are better and if you find you are concerned that we need to tighten our belt a little bit longer this year that you could hold off on buying this there is not a limit?

Mayor Mason: When I see it from a procedural standpoint, Mr. President, if Council does waive the three readings, we would still have 30 days before the Ordinance became effective unless they declared it an emergency.

Mr. Vincent: Correct.

Mayor Mason: Frankly, we still want to keep watching the numbers. By moving this from being a cash outlay to being financed it would at least alleviate the cash flow issue that I am concerned with. Again, it would be like mortgaging or using a line of credit to put a porch on your house or a new roof on your house instead of using cash. I think that is a good analogy.

Mr. Vincent: Okay, alright. With that, I will ask again, and you do not have to do this Council, because you can do what you want. With that, as far as asking to waive I assume we are going to meet in two weeks by teleconference, but I don't know. Things could get worse. We hope not, but with that just to ask one more time is anyone interested in waiving this and if not it is perfectly fine.

Mr. Roberts moved to waive the readings and it was seconded by Mr. Ware.

Mr. Vincent: Thank you, Mayor. I appreciate it. Mr. Arnett, I have shared with you personally on the phone. You have done a wonderful job. I really appreciate you and I know Council appreciates you. You couldn't have been any easier to work with. You always did your very best and went above and beyond over and over again as far as giving great service to the City of Zanesville, people in the City, and also Council and the Administration. You simply to an excellent job. I am happy for you moving on to a bigger position. I wish you were serving our county with this, but maybe that will change sometime. I do appreciate you very, very much. I am sad to see you go, but very happy for you. Thank you.

William Arnett: Thank you.

PRIVATE PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

No Non-agenda item petitions were filed for this meeting.

Mr. Vincent: Is there anything else? Is there anything else from Council? Anything from the Administration? Mayor, did you have anything else?

Mayor Mason: The only thing I was going to mention and we sort of covered it earlier is we are doing what we can to, by we, I mean Rhonda, Scott, Doug, and William are doing what we can to watch what our cash outlay will be over the next few days and weeks. The big issues are in everybody's experience is the drop in gasoline sales will lead to a drop in gasoline tax so we will be looking at our resurfacing. We have a project that was bid. It came in well under the engineering amount which it had to, but we haven't awarded yet because we wanted to make sure we had enough cash to cover it. We are paving presently with the 2019 Ohio Public Works Commission funds as you know you just passed an Ordinance for next years. The one being done now is been paid out of money, that was put aside that I think is matched by the state money. So, looking forward to getting some asphalt down. I think it is about \$620,000 on this project. We will continue to take a look. I think Rhonda and I will have a better feel for income tax probably in about another week to two weeks to see what our income tax levels are. We are blessed to have several major businesses in the area: Genesis, Spectrum, Halliburton, as each of those have been impacted somewhat economically. We are going to take a look at those revenues on income tax. Again, that will give us a little bit of a feel come June when we reassess our budget ordinance. We did see a drop of revenue of roughly 28% or 29% on water, sewer, sanitation, and refuse because of the moratorium on disconnects. We will see if that bounces back and recaptures some of those lost revenues. Ultimately it should; it is just a matter of when. So that is why we are watching the cash. We should regain most of our water, sewer, and utilities;

you will probably never regain the income tax. That is a permanent dent. Gas Tax is also a permanent dent. We won't regain that.

On the bright side, I do know the state is pushing some of their projects out into various quarters into other fiscal years. So, if we are bidding projects that might mean it could be a buyers' market versus a sellers' market because we will be having people bid in with less competition from state contracts. So, that might be something we consider if we do in fact reject the bids on our resurfacing, which was a \$420,000 engineer's estimate, and try to rebid because if the state of Ohio isn't bidding we are not competing against them which means we get a better bid. So, we are looking at all of these things trying to keep the big picture, but make sure we take care of the important details.

Mr. Vincent: Thank you, Mayor. Are there any questions from Council? Before we adjourn, I would like to say a special thank you to Y-City News who is live streaming this tonight to help us out. We are also streaming this to the cable access channel. If you are having discoloration that is an issue we are having internally. I hope it is worked out and hope to have it fixed the next time. So, it is not your TV set. I would like to thank Lisa Hittle who is our IT Director here at the City. She has done many wonderful and amazing things to make this happen tonight with two conference lines and running the camera for us. We do appreciate that. Thank you all for being here. We have our masks here and we will mask back up before we leave. The Mayor has his mask ready to go. If there is nothing else from Council, I will entertain a motion to adjourn.

Ms. Gildow moved to adjourn. It was seconded by Mrs. Osborn. A voice vote was taken with all being in favor. Motion carries.

**ORDINANCE NO. 2020 - 68
INTRODUCED BY COUNCIL**

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE PROPER CITY OFFICIAL TO ADVERTISE FOR BIDS, AWARD CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTS, AND EXPEND FUNDS FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE REHABILITATE RUNWAY 4/22 PROJECT, RUNWAY 4 OBSTRUCTION REMOVAL PROJECT, AND THE RUNWAY 34 OBSTRUCTION REMOVAL PROJECT, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the City is applying for FY 20 grant funding from the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) for the Rehabilitate Runway 4/22 Project, the Runway 4 Obstruction Removal Project, and the Runway 34 Obstruction Removal Project; and

WHEREAS, Crawford, Murphy and Tilly, Inc. has designed said projects in anticipation of award of funds from the FAA, and has determined the estimated cost of each project to be as follows; and

- Rehabilitate Runway 4/22 Project \$25,000
- Runway 4 Obstruction Removal Project \$30,000
- Runway 34 Obstruction Removal Project \$75,000

WHEREAS, the FAA is requiring bids and grant submittal by June 15, 2020, and the actual bid must accompany the grant submittal, therefore this ordinance needs passage as an emergency. Failure to secure grant funding from the FAA for this project could result in further delay of the projects and further deterioration of the existing Airport facilities, potentially creating a health and safety hazard for those that utilize the Airport.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Council of the City of Zanesville, State of Ohio, that:

SECTION ONE: The proper City official is hereby authorized to advertise for bids, award construction contracts, and expend funds in an estimated total amount of \$130,000.00 for the construction of the Rehabilitate Runway 4/22 Project, the Runway 4 Obstruction Removal Project, and the Runway 34 Obstruction Removal Project. The funds shall be paid from City Line Item 615.6415.54413, with the FAA contributing 90% Airport Improvement Program (AIP) funding and 10% CARES Act funding.

SECTION TWO: For the reasons stated above, this Ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure. Provided it receives the affirmative vote of six (6) or more members of City Council, this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval of the Mayor. Otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.



INTRODUCED BY COUNCIL

**AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE PROPER CITY OFFICIAL TO
UTILIZE BUCHANAN AUCTION SERVICE FOR THE PURPOSE OF
DISPOSING OF SURPLUS CITY PROPERTY
AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY**

WHEREAS, the City of Zanesville has surplus vehicles and equipment being stored and in need of disposal, as shown in Attachment A; and

WHEREAS, to expediently sell the unused property, the City received quotes from three local auction services, and Buchanan Auction Service submitted the lowest quote to provide such service, as shown in Attachment B; and

WHEREAS, auctioning of used equipment is allowable under Section 721.15 of the Ohio Revised Code, requiring similar public notification of advertisements for bid for sale of such property; and

WHEREAS, the current storage facility is almost at capacity, so if this Ordinance is not passed as an emergency it is likely that these vehicles and equipment will be stored in an unsecure location thereby inviting theft, vandalism, or other crimes which would be detrimental to the health, safety and welfare of the community.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Zanesville, State of Ohio, that:

SECTION ONE: The proper city official is hereby authorized to utilize Buchanan Auction Service to hold an auction for the disposal of unused City equipment.

SECTION TWO: That all items to be disposed of will be sold to the highest and best bid.

SECTION THREE: That Buchanan Auction Service shall receive 3% of the gross sales for conducting the auction.

SECTION FOUR: For the reasons stated in the preamble hereto, this Ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure. Provided it receives the affirmative vote of six (6) or more members of City Council, this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval of the Mayor. Otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 1141.05 TABLE 15 PERMITTED AND CONDITIONAL USES
 IN BUSINESS DISTRICTS**

WHEREAS, through a comprehensive review of the Planning and Zoning Code, The Community Development Department has identified a need to update the chapter; and

WHEREAS, according to Section 1117.01 “To adapt to changing development conditions and provide for the phased implementation of the City Comprehensive Plan, the Planning Commission may from time to time recommend, and Council may adopt, amendments to the provisions of the text of this Zoning Code...as provided by the Ohio Revised Code.”, and

WHEREAS, the Community Development Staff has recognized a need to amend and update the Chapter 1141.05 Table 15: Permitted and Conditional Uses in Business Districts; and

WHEREAS, proper notification of the intent of this proposed legislation was given in a newspaper of general circulation; and

WHEREAS, after taking testimony and discussion during the March 17th, 2020 regular meeting, the Zanesville Planning Commission has recommended to City Council that the proposed amendments to Chapter 1141.05 be approved.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Zanesville, State of Ohio; that

ORDINANCE NO. 2020 - 14

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE CITY TO ENTER INTO ENERGY SAVINGS CONTRACTS WITH ABM TECHNICAL SOLUTIONS, LLC.

WHEREAS, The City of Zanesville's City Council (the "Council"), is authorized under Ohio Revised Code ("ORC") Section 717.02 to select a vendor for the purpose of developing an energy conservation report; and,

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 19-77 authorized and directed the Mayor to enter into an agreement with the firm of ABM Technical Solutions, LLC for the provision of an energy conservation report; and,

WHEREAS, as a result of the energy conservation report, the Council has determined to undertake capital projects consisting of, but not limited to, all or some of the following: a guaranteed energy savings and conversion project, including the planning, design, purchase, acquisition, installation, construction, equipping and furnishing of energy savings repairs, renovations, upgrades and improvements to buildings and facilities operated by the City of Zanesville as funds are available to undertake and complete (the "Project"); and,

WHEREAS, in order to implement the Project, the Council proposes to enter into an Energy Savings Contract and an Energy Equipment Installation Contract with ABM Technical Solutions, LLC (the "Contracts"); and,

WHEREAS, the City is authorized under the Constitution and laws of the State of Ohio (the "State"), to enter into financing agreements (including lease obligations) to finance capital improvements for the governmental and miscellaneous functions of the City if so desired; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Contracts, the City Council desires to acquire certain equipment with a cost not to exceed \$11,800,000, constituting improvements at the various City facilities, and water metering infrastructure; and,

WHEREAS, the proposed improvements will result in an estimated savings in energy, maintenance, voided capital costs, opportunity cost, and operating expense of \$19,756,469 over twenty (20) years.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Zanesville, State of Ohio, that:

SECTION 1. That the Mayor be and hereby is authorized and directed to enter into agreements with the firm of ABM Technical Solutions, LLC for the provision of the aforementioned services.

SECTION 2. That the City Council finds that the amount of money to be spent on the Energy Conservation Measures is not likely to exceed the amount of money the City will save in energy, operating, maintenance, opportunity cost and voided capital costs over the average system life of the measures as specified in the energy conservation report.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE CITY TO ENTER INTO A TAX-EXEMPT MUNICIPAL LEASE FOR THE FUNDING OF ENERGY CONSERVATION MEASURES IN THE CITY PROVIDED BY ABM TECHNICAL SOLUTIONS, LLC.

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 2020-14 authorized and directed the City to enter into an agreement with ABM Technical Solutions, LLC in an amount not to exceed \$11,800,000 for the implementation of energy conservation measures throughout the City; and,

WHEREAS, the City is authorized under the laws of the State of Ohio, to enter into financing agreements, including lease obligations, to fund capital improvements for the governmental and miscellaneous functions of the City if so desired.

NOW BE IT ORDAINED, by the City Council of the City of Zanesville, State of Ohio, that:

SECTION 1. The Mayor is hereby authorized and directed to enter into a municipal lease agreement in order to fund the implementation of energy conservation measures provided by ABM Technical Solutions, LLC.
